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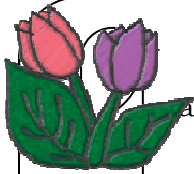
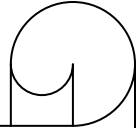

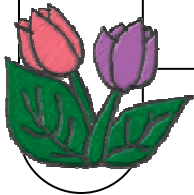
April 2007**HAPPY EASTER**

On behalf of the Newsletter Committee, I should like to thank the Parish Council most sincerely for your positive and timely response to our letter.

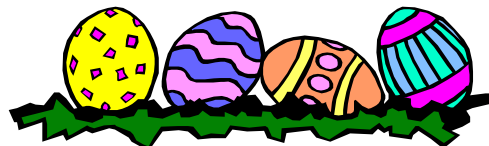
We are absolutely delighted that you have felt able to increase your donation to the Newsletter so substantially. This will, without a doubt, go a long way in meeting our recent increased costs.

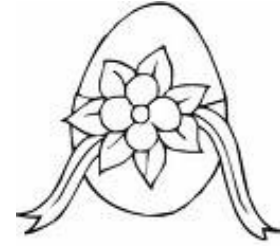
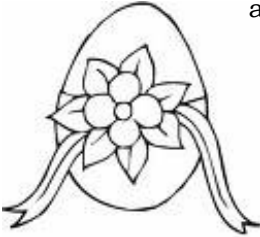


Easter in Denmark

Most families in Denmark celebrate Easter with great family reunions where the families gather around a festive dinner table. Families are rather preoccupied with colourful table decorations, such as daffodils and yellow and purple napkins. It is also quite popular to paint and to decorate the eggs during the Easter holiday. Children usually get Easter Eggs made of chocolate from their parents and grandparents.

Easter in Germany

The Germans have a number of egg games which the children play over the holidays. One tradition is to blow eggs and paint them in multiple colours and patterns on Good Friday. The eggs are then put in a basket for the Easter bunny -- Osterhase-- to hide around the house on the night leading up to Easter Sunday. On the morning of Easter Sunday, the children go hunting for the eggs and often find that the Easter bunny has also left chocolate eggs and Easter presents for them to find.



Easter in India

Easter eggs and bunnies are sold in stores, and people exchange these items with each other during Easter. It is quite common to see people dressed up as Easter bunnies distributing candy to children at stores during this time of the year. Schools and churches have special programs in which stories of the rebirth of Christ are enacted. Most children in Christian homes get new clothes for the occasion, and the entire family goes to church for a special Mass on the day. Families also get together for traditional Easter lunches at which turkey is generally served.

Easter in Poland

In Poland they celebrate Easter with the **Blessing Basket**. They prepare the basket the Saturday before Easter. Inside the basket they place beautifully coloured eggs, bread, cake, salt, paper and white coloured sausages and with the basket they then go to church to have the basket of food blessed. It is believed that **Great Lent**, which is the forty-day fast before Easter is not over until the basket has been, blessed hence the reason why it is called Blessing Basket.

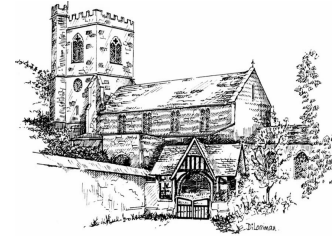

Adventures in Africa

Hello from Lisa Goodship...

We continued our travels down through Africa.....

With an early start we left behind Antelope Park, Zimbabwe and headed for Bulawayo. In Bulawayo we split into two groups, our group visiting some ancient caves where we saw some 10,000-30,000 year old hieroglyphics. To get to the caves was fairly exhausting, but enjoyable, walk, rock climb. Breath back, we then went to a conservation area, to walk with black rhino. It was amazing being within metres of these beautiful animals.

From Bulawayo, next stop was Victoria Falls. We had a choice of travelling on an overnight sleeper train (complete with cockroaches) or another game drive at Hawangi. We chose the game drive. It was fantastic. We saw elephant, giraffe, wilder beast, buffalo, crocodiles, hippos, ostrich and bat eared foxes. All this followed by a beautiful sunset. Definitely the best choice.

We had to be up very early next day for our drive to Victoria Falls. At Victoria we had opted for an adrenaline day- a bit different! First was abseiling, which we did from a 53m vertical cliff, then rap jumping which is the running version of abseiling. Next on to the high wire, which is like the flying fox but done in a harness, superman style, with a 5 meter run up to get extra speed and distance. The highlight of our day was the gorge swing – a vertical cliff with a 53m freefall (3.5 seconds) then pendulum to the bottom of the gorge.(Time to launder underwear!!)

We both did this forwards first, which was the scariest, then a tandem. Dallas did a third jump backwards, but I came to my senses after 2 jumps. Wow! What a day! On the agenda next was rafting in Victoria Falls, one of our planned highlights and a huge experience. The grade 4 and 5 rapids of the Zambezi River tipped us out on several occasions. At times it seemed like we were going through a washing machine and getting stuck under the raft but this just added to the fear factor.

After such a hectic schedule, we decided next day to chill out. A quiet morning walk to Victoria Falls was perfect. It was low water so with less spray we were able to take excellent photographs.

Leaving the Falls we headed into Botswana. Botswana is a country with no national debt. It is richer than most African nations so it was nice not to be hassled for money. Our next game drive took us through Chobe National Park. We saw thousands of elephants, many with young calves and a huge selection of other animals. After lunch we were on a river cruise down Chobe River getting very close to hippos, crocodiles and elephants. We think we photographed a hippo yawning which is the shot everyone wants.

Continuing our journey, next stop Okavango Delta. The Delta is a vast expanse of wetlands with islands scattered throughout. To explore the Delta we were using a mokoro, which is a wooden dug out canoe made from ebony or sausage tree. The guys are extremely talented poling but the fact that the canoes were unstable and with about a 3 inch clearance between us and the water made it a nervous start. We were only about 10 minutes into the reeds when we came across some elephants making us feel quite vulnerable. In fact it was then that we realised just how vulnerable we were when the guide (unarmed) gave us a talk on what to do if we encountered various animals. Lions – stand completely still, don't show fear, look big and dominant. Elephant – hide if you can or run zig zag because they can't turn corners – mm! Easier said than done!! We saw a lot of animals and thankfully didn't need any safety measures. From the canoe a quick shower, then off to the airport for a flight over the Delta. Flying only a few feet above the ground we spotted many different types of animals.

Amazing...but...throughout our trip we hadn't seen one cheetah. Moving on from the Delta we started a long drive into Namibia for our stay at Winhoek. It was good to be back in the city, civilisation and catch up on our emails.

We enjoyed a game meal at Joes Beerhouse. Dallas had gemsbok and I had a kebab of crocodile, ostrich, kudu, zebra and chicken – delicious. Swiftly on our way we had a really long drive to

Etosh National Park where we encountered massive thunderstorms and torrential rains. Our next four game drives were fun but due to the weather the animals were scarce and we were disappointed knowing these were our last drives.

Finally we got to see the cheetah but not in the wild. Our next campsite was at Cheetah Park. This park was established by a family who fell in love with some cheetah cubs and also disagreed with the law allowing cheetah to be hunted. Farmers consider cheetah a pest and shoot on sight so Cheetah Park pay to be allowed to trap and relocate. Unfortunately current law states that all captured animals must be sterilised so a release/breeding programme is not possible.

Next day we had a half day drive to Spitzcap, probably our favourite bush camp and it reminded me of Ayres Rock. There were massive rock formations everywhere and we saw the most beautiful sunset.

A huge swarm of bees meant we had a quick breakfast and swiftly headed off to Swakopmund. On route we stopped at the Cape Cross seal colony. Ugh, such a vile smell I will never forget!! The seals were calving – pups just born, being born and lots of territorial fighting.

At Swakopmund we needed a good nights sleep in preparation for the fun, activity day ahead.

Dune boarding (sledding down sand dunes on fibre boards) was first. Lying down on our boards we started on the gentle slopes and reached speeds of up to 40 km. More confident we progressed to 'big mamma' where we reached speeds of 76km per hour. Great fun until we had to spend hours showering to clear the sand from all those hard to reach places. Quad biking next. Dressed in all the safety gear we spent 2 hours riding around and playing roller coaster in the sand dunes. Fab and I managed to complete without injury – that's a skill in itself.

Moving on we headed to River Canyon which is one of the larger canyons in Africa. At our camp site there was swim pool which was fed by hot springs (not the smelly type) . After a long truck drive it looked wonderful. We were soon sat in the water with our beers watching the stars – sheer bliss!

Our travels were soon coming to an end as we headed down the Orange River to Citrusdal and Stellenbosh where we had a full day wine tour booked. It was a big day enjoyed by all and some a little too much! We learned a lot, tasted some good and some bad wines but kept civilised enough to enjoy a nice meal at the end of the day.

The final day of our journey approached and we drove into Cape Town. 54 days on a truck with 20 plus other people had come to an end and we all went our separate ways.

We chose to have 4 days in Cape Town to chill out before we flew to New Zealand.

One day to get our bearings, then we were up early to walk up Table Mountain. We wanted a good start before the sun got too hot. It took us one and a half hours to reach the top and how worthwhile it was. Very clear and fantastic views. We realised just how high we were when Qantas flew past. After a celebratory beer we hitched a lift back in a cable car.

Next day Dallas went cage diving with great white sharks. Unfortunately he was one of the unlucky ones. He saw sharks at a distance but not whilst in the cage. This means we have some unfinished business in Africa so we must go back again one day so he gets a free go! After a cultural tour of the shanty town which surrounds the city and some retail therapy we flew to New Zealand.

Want a fantastic 9 week expedition . Now it is back to reality. We are currently looking for employment and a place to live

ENFORD HISTORY

Taken from The Enford Newsletter March 1967

I had intended to keep, as far as possible, to chronological order in these notes but we must make an exception this month as March 2nd is a most memorable anniversary of the fall of Enford Church Spire.

We do not know the date of the building of this spire, but it may have been contemporary with the tower and quite possibly dates from the 15th century. Fortunately we have an excellent picture of it, painted by John Buckler, a copy of which hangs in the Vestry.

All we do know is that on Sunday March 2nd 1817, it was struck by lightning and crashed across the church where the organ now stands. I can find no mention of this calamitous happening in the newspapers of the time, and presume that no lives were lost.

The damage however was very considerable. The Wiltshire Antiquary, Charles Hoare, writing in 1920, describes the church as 'ruinous and unusable' and wondered if it would ever be restored for use again.

In this however, he was mistaken. Damaged it certainly was but a newspaper account of 1823 states that it had never been out of use, and that part of it had been separated OFF FOR USE at Divine Service... 'business as usual!'

The vicar at that time was the absentee John Prince, (who spent most of his 41 years incumbency in Lambeth, where he had a lucrative chaplaincy). At length the archdeacon wrote a very stern letter to the vicar and churchwardens commanding them to TAKE SOME STEPS. Mr Prince appeared from London and issued an appeal to the public and the churchwardens levied a heavy rate, and by grants and collections the cost was somehow met.

The date 1825 is still to be seen on the outside of the south nave wall of the church, and marks the date of this part of the rebuilding. The work was not, however, completed until 1830... 13 years after the catastrophe!

LARGELY YOUR DECISION

It is some time since we have visited a different local restaurant and therefore my newsletter articles have been sadly lacking (some readers might consider this a bonus.) However, what better excuse was there recently than to book a table in order to celebrate our daughter's birthday. We had visited 'The Millstream' some years ago when it first opened amid much publicity in the media. We had been impressed, not particularly by the food, but by the renovations which had transformed this neglected village pub into a welcoming, full of character, upmarket restaurant. Time, we thought, to give it a second chance.

Following the dark, windy road to Marden on a fairly cold wintry night 'The Millstream' was a welcoming sight delineated, as it was, by its subtle external lighting. The car park was almost full, which was encouraging and suggestive that this was still a popular place at which to eat. As we entered by the front door, the warm glow of the open burning fire exuded a welcoming ambience, as did the subdued lighting against which seemingly satisfied diners were silhouetted at their tables. It was much the same as we remembered it.

Ordering drinks at the bar, Rob, who, donning a ranger hat and a small, knotted, goatee beard, served us. He earnestly posed questions to ensure our drinks were exactly what we had asked for, "It's his first night" we were told as if to apologise for his lack of knowledge, but actually we thought him perfectly competent and certainly a 'colourful' addition to the bar staff.

On being given the menu of the day along with the specials menu we were shown to our table and asked if we would like some bread and olives. A platter of delicious fresh crusty bread and olives duly arrived (beware -the additional cost was £5!!!) The choice of starters was limited, so much so that my daughter declined to have one, whilst I chose the portobello mushroom topped with goats cheese and my husband the tomato and basil soup. The soup proved very tasty but mine was certainly nothing special and something I could have cooked at home very easily. Again the choice of main course was limited and even with the additional specials, nothing really impressed us. It was an easy choice, sea bass for my husband and steaks for both my daughter and myself. All came beautifully presented (at a price), the pieces of Sea Bass delicately perched on a bed of mashed

potato and the sirloin steaks appeared succulent under the half a dozen designer- looking chips that were criss- crossed on the top. Aware of the lack of accompanying vegetables (in the case of the steaks half a Portobello mushroom and a half tomato) had caused us to order salads of rocket and Parmesan and although we were brought mixed leaf salads, there seemed little point to having them changed. Rounding off the meal with desserts we chose sticky toffee pudding and crème brûlée. The sticky toffee was far too large a portion and too treacly for our liking and the brûlée, average.

Just the name, "The Millstream" evokes the idea of a lovely establishment so it was a great disappointment, certainly on this occasion, that the food on offer was not in keeping with its classy surroundings. To warrant such high prices one expects a high standard of food – something special to remember. The only memorable experience in this instance unfortunately was the bill – (£115 for 3 of us inc drinks)

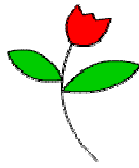

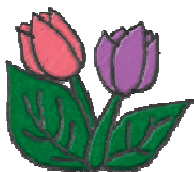

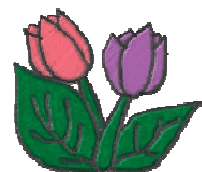

PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY (FOOTPATHS/BRIDLEWAYS/BYWAYS)

During September and October 2006, a number of reports were submitted to CLARENCE, regarding various defects apparent on the Public Footpaths and Bridleways of Enford Parish. I am now pleased to inform readers that work on some PROWs has been completed, but of particular note is the Bridleway, (Enford no 1), which runs in a northerly direction from the road C32, at Chisenbury Court, East Chisenbury. Having been neglected for a number of years, the first four hundred yards of that route was completely overgrown with weeds, trees and bushes,

and the gate at the end of that initial stretch, was 'sealed, thus denying access to all'. That Bridleway has now been cleared and is open for use.

A second path, (Sawpit Lane, Enford), has also been cleared of undergrowth, and is now open.

On Monday 12 March 2007, I had a short meeting with the Right of Way Warden from Wiltshire County Council, responsible for this area. I was informed that as a result of a number of complaints, the warden had personally visited and inspected the PROWs in question. Two particular footpaths discussed were Coombe to Fifield, (Enford no19), and East to West Chisenbury, (Enford no 31). The warden now fully understands that each of these paths is a vital link between communities within the Parish, and particularly that each is required for access by residents, either alone or with young children in push chairs, to public transport facilities

on the A345. I was assured that every effort will be made to maintain these footpaths to a satisfactory standard.

Also discussed was the footpath travelling east, (Enford no 25), from the junction of the A345/8087, (Enford Hill), and begins with the ascent of a flight of steps. In accordance with my report, the warden agreed that these steps, and the initial path through the small wood at the top are dangerous due to broken/damaged steps, and the volume of undergrowth on this path. Repair/clearance work is due to commence shortly.

So, please keep reporting to CLARENCE, (0800 232323), obtain a reference number, and pass the details to me. Your report can then be followed up to check on progress.

The small effort required, has and will produce some good results.

TRAINING: April will be a generally quiet month on the Plain with little activity leading up to and over the Easter period. A preoperational TESEX will start on Mon 16 April and last until the end of the first week of May but this should not cause undue disturbance apart from some fast jet activity on the last day of the month.

LIVE FIRING: : Normal live firing takes place from 0830 - 1700 hrs daily, but may continue throughout the night, this is normally on Tuesdays and Thursday only. Noise may be greater in certain areas depending upon the meteorological conditions at the time of firing. Dates and locations are subject to change

AIRCRAFT TRIALS:

Aircraft may conduct trials over Larkhill Range on each Wed and Fri from 1200 - 1700 hrs which could involve circuits to the East crossing the Avon Valley.
