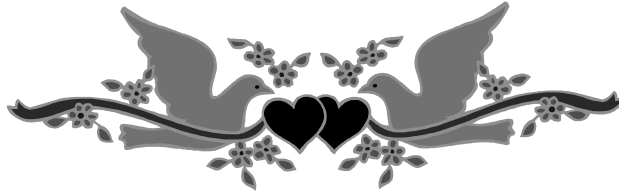

BROADBAND IN ENFORD

The following letter was written to Claire Perry MP. Her response is also enclosed.

In a hand-written note, Claire has also asked me to urge everyone who can to visit the BT 'Race To Infinity' website (<http://www.racetoinfinity.bt.com/>) and vote for Netheravon.

When I hear from Ian Livingston, I'll publish that as well.

Dear Claire,

As a self-employed IT contractor, I spend about 60% of my working week working remotely online. I am therefore very much dependent on the performance of broadband, and consequently take a keen interest.

Problem No 1 The Enford telephone network is connected to the Netheravon exchange by an underground cable. At the southern end of the village, we are a little over a mile from the exchange – on a good day we can get over 2 Mbps however, in the north of the village (almost 3 miles from the exchange), people struggle to get 0.7 Mbps.

Problem No 2 Because the number of telephone lines into the village is limited by the capacity of the underground cable, many existing lines in the village have had to be split, using DACS (Digital Access Carrier System) technology, in order to give every house a phone line. However, where a line has been 'DACSeD', it is only capable of connecting to the internet at dial-up speeds (30Kbps or thereabouts).

This means there are a number of houses which are close enough to the exchange to get a reasonably good broadband speed, but are unable to do so due to insufficient lines. A neighbour on a DACSeD line, who recently enquired to BT about getting a proper broadband connection, was advised they would have to pay £45,000.

BT Infinity I see that BT are rolling out their next generation 'super-fast' fibre-optic broadband based on some sort of competition. Whichever communities collect the largest number of votes appear to get put at the front of the queue.

In conversation with a BT technician, I am however led to believe that even if Netheravon exchange were to win this competition, it is not expected that the fibre-optic would be laid beyond the confines of cabinets in Netheravon village – so this is unlikely to benefit anyone in Enford

Any Hope For The Future?

I note from your website that you have personally campaigned to bring broadband to your village, so I'm assuming this is a subject you also feel strongly about. Quite clearly it is we in rural areas, devoid of easy access to public transport, and remote from places of work, who stand to gain the most from a good broadband connection.

However, having searched the internet for the present government's manifesto on delivering broadband, I'm unable to find any specific proposals regarding improvement to broadband in rural communities, so I'd be grateful if you could advise to what extent, and when, we are ever likely to see any change in the current situation. Additionally, what if any obligations do BT have towards the community:

Do they have any obligations to deliver a minimum broadband infrastructure – if so, what is it?

Where there are insufficient lines to meet the community's needs, do they have any obligation to lay more without passing on the cost to the community?

If the answer to these questions is 'no', then do you have any suggestions as to how communities like ours should try and improve things?

Reply from Claire Perry

Dear Mr Becker

Thank you very much for getting in touch regarding Rural Broadband and in particular, Broadband in Enford. As you rightly say, I share your interest in this important issue, as I believe a high speed broadband infrastructure is a key requirement if we are to have a living and working countryside. Inexcusably, the UK is currently one of the slowest countries in the developed world for broadband, with especially poor levels of service in 'not-spots' and in rural areas.

My colleague, Jeremy Hunt MP, the Secretary of State, has set out an action plan to deliver superfast broadband to the UK. He has stated that the benefits of superfast broadband should be available to everyone, including those in rural areas. He has set out an action plan to help create a broadband infrastructure that meets the needs of all its citizens and businesses, and that will stand in comparison to anywhere in the world.

The government aims to make us the first country in Europe to extend superfast 100Mbps broadband across most of the population. We will achieve this by opening up BT's ducts to competitors, easing planning rules and boosting competition to encourage a market led solution. Where necessary, to make sure rural areas have access to this new infrastructure, we will use the element of the television licence fee used for digital switchover.

In October 2010, the Government announced that four rural areas that include some of the most remote and geographically challenging parts of the UK have been selected to pilot the next generation of high speed broadband. Each area will be allocated around £5-£10m from a total of a £530m funding announced in The Comprehensive Spending Review to support the roll-out of broadband between now and 2015 to areas that the market alone will not reach. Parts of Cumbria, the Highlands and Islands, North Yorkshire and the Golden Valley in Herefordshire will all be connected at speeds only usually found in densely populated urban areas. The pilot exercise will help establish the commercial costs and challenges involved in rolling out superfast broadband across the UK.

I believe our approach will be a cost effective means of dramatically improving the internet service across the country. It will provide the service that people and businesses want and will further diminish problems of digital exclusion across our communities.

With regard to BT and the two specific points you raise with regard to their obligations towards the community, I have today written to Ian Livingston, CEO of BT asking him for his comments. I will of course get back to you as soon as I have heard from him.

May I take this opportunity to wish you a very happy Christmas and peaceful New Year

FAMILY HISTORY

This is a copy of an email sent to The Newsletter from Christine Scott who wants to trace her family history after reading the Newsletter on the Internet. It is good to know that our website is being tapped into to by many ex residents and those who have family connections.

I now live in Templecombe. I was brought up in Chirton and was born in Devizes. My Father Stanley Potter was born in Upavon 1911. My great great grandmother Jemima Bird born 1806 married William Potter born 1805 in Rushall. Anymore info please let me know. I would also like to get hold of the book Enford Days, does anyone have a copy I could borrow or buy.

I am related to many families in Enford, Buckland, Phillimore, Bird, Daw Macklin, Cannings etc. One of my ancestors was a real rogue, perhaps someone in Enford remembers the stories relating to him. **Stephen Bird** Born about 1800 died 1st July 1886 Newtown, Enford. Cause of death Morbus Cordis, Anasarca 2 months. Occupation Umbrella Maker. Sarah Bird mother. She had two illegitimate children Stephen baptised 24th Oct 1802 and Jemima baptised 15th Oct 1806. Sarah took out a bastardy order in October 1806 against John Hawkins of Figheldean - a hamlet within the parish of Enford. Stephen married Elizabeth Phillimore in Enford on 24th May 1828. They had two daughters Isabella born about 1829 and Jane born about 1832. 13th July 1826 Warminster Sessions Stephen Bird age 21, Henry Hurcott age 24 and Thomas Andrews age 20 were charged with "having feloniously stolen 12 fowls the property of George Smith at Enford". They were sentenced to imprisonment in the house of correction at Devizes for 12 months hard labour. 18th October 1842 Marlborough Bridewell Stephen Bird age 37 6th April 1847 Devizes Assizes Stephen Bird (no age given) 15 months in prison for "diabolical assault". 8th April 1851 Salisbury Sessions 1. Stephen Bird age 54 found not guilty of receiving stolen goods at Wilsford 2. Stephen Bird charged with stealing a quarter bag, the property of Thomas and Howell Simpson. Sentenced to transportation for 7 years and in the meantime to be confined in County Gaol. **(He was never transported, but served his sentence in Dartmoor)** Home Office and Prison Commission: Male Licences PCOM 3/22/2157 Licence No 2157 Stephen Bird convicted at Salisbury, Wilts 9th April 1850 Sentence 7 years. Transportation Licence granted 4th Dec 1854 for early late 1854. 26th Nov 1869 Stealing eighty-five pounds weight of wool the property of the executors of the late James Martin of Enford. Guilty of Larceny after three previous convictions. Sentence at order of Court Penal Servitude for seven years and to be subject to the supervision of the police for seven years. 1871 Census Stephen Bird aged 68 born Salisbury, Wilts - Weymouth Dorset, Isle of Portland, Male Convict Establishment, Portland I am also trying to obtain a copy of Enford Days by Fred Phillimore, does anyone have a copy I could borrow or buy. I have just read a book called Winifred - A Wiltshire Working Girl by Sylvia Marlow, this mentioned Enford. I would love to hear from anyone about the history of Enford. 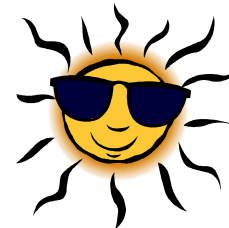
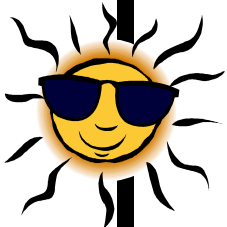

LOCAL POLICING

As I write it is wet and miserable, which I think is an improvement on snowy and freezing. Snow is pretty, but our infrastructure is not designed to cope with it. It gives youths the opportunity to throw snowballs at the elderly, it blocks roads, it damages the economy. I am hoping for a mild wet snow-free spring.

The early evenings are ideal cover for a team of deception burglars. There are two of them, one tall in his forties, the other younger. They only knock on the door of lone females, aged 55 to 85, and they burgle in the afternoon and early evening. They tell the occupier that they are from the Water Works, and they need to check faulty pipes. Once inside, they split up, one stays with the householder, and the other searches handbags, purses and jewellery boxes. They have taken cash, silver and gold.

Local crime indicates that there is a burglar active locally. There have been one outhouse burglary, three dwelling burglaries and an attempt in Collingbourne Ducis, where offenders stole laptops and cash. There have been similar offences in villages nearby. There was also an attempt to break into an industrial unit in Cadley Road. There have been several cases of hare coursing and poaching between Everleigh and Collingbourne Kingston.

AN UNFORGETTABLE CRUISE

I was lucky enough to be asked by friends to join them on a cruise in the Indian Ocean, starting from Mauritius and going to Mombassa via Reunion, Madagascar, Zanzibar, Dar es Salaam and several other beautiful tropical islands. Having never been to the tropics before I immediately accepted.

On the fourth day, the Captain gave a lecture on piracy in the area, the security arrangements on board and how we, the passengers, should react 'in the highly unlikely event that anything occurs'. We were to offer no resistance, remain calm, and take no photographs. The lights would be dimmed. He told us of some of the ship's defences—there were coils of razor wire round the stern, water cannons on either side and a piercing whistle aft of the ship which could deafen anyone who came within a short distance of it. We also had on board 5 Madagascan security guards, dressed all in black and bristling with guns.

It was a beautiful starlit evening and the sea was calm as we sailed from Mayotte to Zanzibar. During dinner a message came from the Captain over the ship's tannoy that a suspicious vessel was approaching and those who were having dinner were to muster immediately in the lounge; the crew were given the code word Papa which meant to go to emergency stations immediately, then those of us in the dining room were told to join the other passengers in the lounge. We knew he meant pirates. There were over 320 passengers and a dozen or so crew. The watertight doors were locked and fear and claustrophobia shot through me. I said a silent prayer for our safety.

The lounge grew hotter and hotter. There was no access to the loo. A pianist started a sing-song - I Do Like To Be Beside The Seaside, On Ilkley Moor Bartat and other jolly songs—I think we had Rule Britannia at one point. The ship's hooters were blasting, there was a lot of noise and the ship was lurching. The Captain kept us informed. At one point the said vessel was closing in on us. We waited. A long pause. It was terrifying. We were served fruit juice. Then the good news came—the vessel was receding. We had been barricaded in for about an hour and a half. When at last we heard we had escaped the pirates. At last we could return to dinner. In no time a waiter was by my side - your beef madam, rare I think. The passengers and crew alike all remained calm but there can be no-one there who hadn't feared what might happen. When the Captain eventually returned to his dinner he received a richly deserved standing ovation from us all. Thereafter we were accompanied by security forces, some from the Tanzanian Navy, some from security firms I believe and on my last evening we were guarded by three ships from the Kenyan Navy.

My first reaction was that I wished I were at home—Enford seems such a safe haven. But the next morning we heard about the protection that was in place, and I am so pleased I stayed until the due date for departure. It was a wonderful holiday. More exotic than most!



News from Pewsey Children's Centre

A Sure Start Children's Centre

The new Pewsey Children's Centre is now open! This purpose built building is on the same site as Pewsey Primary and Secondary School, and shares the building with Puddleducks Nursery and is open to all families in the Pewsey Community Area with children aged 0-5years. The centre is open between 8am-6pm, and parents are welcome to call in any time between 9.00 and 4.30pm, when staff are available to provide help and support for any queries. At certain times, parents can visit our Drop In, which is an 'open door' session where the activity room and resources are available for parents/carers and children to use, with no organised activity. The activity room will also be used to run specific sessions, and the Children's Centre will continue with the usual activities taken out to the surrounding villages. Curious Creation is a weekly session on Thursday afternoons from 1.30-2.30 at the old Upavon School and is an hour of messy play.

Dear Friends,

The flu bug has affected many of us this winter, and I was no exception, having to spend two days in bed. I was given two books for Christmas – “The Book Thief” by Markus Zusak set in Germany at the beginning of the Second World War. It tells the story of a nine year old girl who is living with a foster family on Himmel Street near Munich whose parents have been taken away to a concentration camp. Liesl, the little girl, steals books. The story describes the inhabitants of her street when the bombs begin to fall.

The second book, “The Kites are Flying” by Michael Morpurgo – this is a moving read about two Palestinian children, Said and Mahmoud, who fly kites on hot afternoons on the West Bank (Gaza). The breeze blows out of the desert into the hills. In Gaza it comes in off the sea. The children make their own kites out of old plastic bags, newspaper and bits of wood, turning rubbish into something really beautiful.

For nearly a hundred years Jews and Arabs have fought over this small piece of land that lies between the Jordan and the Mediterranean Sea. Many people have been killed and wounded, including children. The pain of death is felt acutely by both sides of the divide. This small book may go towards helping, in a simple way, resolve the conflict. It shows us what is like to be caught up in it. At the very worst time in their lives this beautiful book gives us a sign of hope.

As the flu bug disappeared so too did the snow, revealing the landscape and the winter wheat appearing in meticulous green rows. I noticed the snowdrops in the churchyard – late this year - normally they arrive just in time for Christmas.

I am drawn to the words of St. John’s Gospel that say eternity begins here “In the beginning was the Word...” John 1¹⁻¹⁴. Do read on.

MINISTRY OF DEFENCE

TRAINING ON SPTA

3 Commando Brigade will continue their operational pre- deployment training on Salisbury Plain until 11 February. The exercise, known as Ex PASHTUN DAGGER, will take place across the entire length of the Plain and will involve some 2500 troops, 300 tracked and wheeled armoured vehicles, and both fixed and rotary wing aircraft. Large convoys, some in excess of 80 vehicles, will operate on the training area and there may be some disruption to civilian traffic at tank crossings. For the period of the exercise there will be no access to the Larkhill Artillery Ranges and permissive stone tracks in the Tilshead/Chitterne/Shrewton triangle (Copehill Down area) will be closed in the interest of public safety. Military convoys leaving the Plain at the end of the exercise may cause some disruption from late afternoon on Friday 11 February until 13 February. During the week 14 -18 February activity will peak with a Royal School of Artillery young officers exercise which includes AS90 live firing, a Land Warfare Centre two day armoured exercise, and a Commando Training Centre Royal Marines major exercise. Finally the Royal Dragoon Guards from Catterick will deploy onto the Plain with their Challenger 2 tanks to conduct low level training for the last two weeks of the month.

FIRING NOISE

The main source of noise complaints is the live firing of 155mm AS90 (Artillery System of the 90s) self propelled guns. The firing is closely managed to ensure that legal noise limits are not exceeded and disturbance is minimised. Although some may find the noise intrusive, it is well below legal limits.

ACCESS

Access to Salisbury Plain is regulated by Salisbury Plain Military Lands Byelaws and Bulford, Larkhill and Imber Range Byelaws. This Newsletter is published up to 6 weeks before the event and urgent training bids may come in subsequently. Always comply with local signs and flags.

Access timings can be found on the SPTA Walks Line: (01980) 674763

Bulford Ranges. A number of public rights of way (PROW) run through Bulford Ranges and are closed when firing is taking place and red flags are flying. **No firing is planned for the 5th, 6th, 12th, 13th, 26th, 27th**

Larkhill Ranges. A number of PROW run through Larkhill Ranges and are closed when firing is taking place and flags are flying. The flags may vary in colour (red, red and yellow or red and white) but all mean “keep outside” the line of signs at that boundary. **No firing is planned for 6th, 12th, 13th, 19th, 20th, 26th, 27th.**

Note. In the event of range fires access may be denied to some areas due to the risk of unexploded ordnance “cooking off”.

Imber. Difficult terrain and unexploded military debris make it hazardous to leave the marked routes. The public are excluded from Imber Ranges at all times, even if flags are not flying. The only exception being when the roads through Imber are opened to allow the public to reduce journey times across Imber Ranges.

Note. Even when the roads are open the village remains out of bounds to the public

Dogs. Recently there have been a number of dog attacks on sheep and other dogs. HQ DTE SP is investigating how best to deal with this problem. We have no funds to provide "dog bins" but small amounts of faeces can be placed in any rubbish bin if "bagged". All we ask is that:

Dog walkers stay away from military training.
Owners pick up faeces, bag them, take them home and put them in their own bin.

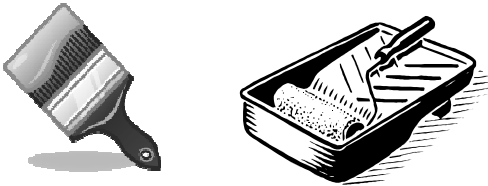
