Tales of a Morris Cowley Part One

I bought an extraordinary car towards the end of 1953 and during my time at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich. During my ownership, I think most things that can happen to a car, happened. These articles cover the saga of some of these happenings. It was all a long time ago, so there may be exaggerations, inaccuracies and a little pure invention. Where there are any of these, I can assure you something like it happened!

The car was a 1928 flat-nosed Morris Cowley four-seater tourer with a canvas roof. When I bought it, the top was fairly tatty and the removable Formica windows mostly opaque. As soon as possible after buying it, I re-painted it in Lord Lonsdale's colours: bright yellow body and black wings. Its registration number was ?H 8032 and if anyone by any chance rescued it, I would love to know.

One of the reasons for buying it was that the previous owner had been leasing it to the BBC for filming "Life with the Lyons" for large sums of money. A requirement for filming was that the driver's door had to fall off at regular intervals: said door was never quite the same again! Sadly this leasing did not continue after I bought it.

The real strength of the car was its engine, it was indestructible. I think the block was made of a particularly hard alloy which practically never needed reboring. I ran mine for 30,000 miles and it did not appear to be any worse for the trip. A naval engineer friend fitted one of these engines up for a bench test. He started the engine one evening and opened the throttle fully; It was still running next morning with no damage!

In those days, you could get away with most things in a car: On the pay of a RN Sub-Lieutenant, I could barely afford to fill the petrol tank, let alone pay for servicing or spares. New tyres were a no-no. To understand why the stories happened one needs to know a little about this car. As with most cars of this age, it had no power steering, wire operated brakes and a long strong handbrake serving the back wheels only, on which one could use both hands. This was frequently necessary, as the main brakes were usually worn to uselessness. I don't think it had indicators or brake lights. It had a dynamo which doubled as a starter motor, which was quite advanced, and made for silent starting since the motor was permanently engaged and therefore did not scrunch. When this worked, it was most impressive, but like other components, the battery was old and rarely had enough puff to turn the engine. Thus the hand crank handle was essential. Luckily, like many cars it was fixed in position and therefore did not get lost! But more of this handle later. It was vital to carry spare half-shafts as these frequently broke. However, this involved very little more work than did a wheel change: you just jacked the wheel up, pulled the wheel off, and then pulled the half shaft out and inserted another, and proceeded happily.

I hope this has whetted you appetite for Morris Cowleys! Read next month's thrilling instalment about the car and a London bus and a few of the more ridiculous episodes in its extraordinary career!

HIGHWAY NEWS

Hello Enford Parish Residents. This report will focus mostly on Wiltshire Council's new Core Strategy for the next 15 years 2011-2026.

In 2009 Wiltshire Council published a Sustainability Appraisal Strategic Environmental Assessment of Transport and Freight for Wiltshire as a means of procuring information for the final Wiltshire Core Strategy Document, intended to take in all aspects of future development and planning. It was pointed out many times to Wiltshire Council that this scooping report omitted to address the **A345** in their forward planning vision!

It is a well-known fact that the A345 is a small sheep drover's road that runs North to South through Wiltshire. It is the most direct route from Southampton via Salisbury/Amesbury (A303) to Swindon and further North of the Country. However, over the past 10 years the A345 has seen a vast increase of traffic. There have been several factors involved in this situation. The first is Wiltshire Unitary Council's reluctance to be aware of, and to recognise, the problems that have been occurring along the North to South rural "A" roads, due to the huge and increasing impact of through traffic along these small fragile roads.

The situation is exacerbated by: the planning applications that have been passed for the Andover Shed Industrial Site and the Solstice Park development Site; the uncontrolled **Satnav** explosion; the wanton waste of £10M of consultation fees regarding the A303 Stonehenge and Winterbourne Stoke stretch of a major East to West highway; and most of all the local authorities' refusal to understand the growing problems along the North to South rural roads, and the need to ensure that all large oversize heavily laden HGV crossing Wiltshire North to South use a signed qualified Sustainable Highways route around the County, namely the A303/A30/A34/A4.

The small fragile rural road infrastructure within Wiltshire is incapable of sustaining the constant amount of pressure that is <u>now</u> being placed upon it, let alone come the year 2026 by when the new core strategy states that a considerable amount of new homes and supporting businesses will have been built in Wiltshire. So it is surprising that there is no mention in the Core Strategy, of any improvements to the rural road infrastructure network to sustain what is now occurring, and to accommodate this forecast new housing, businesses and jobs, with attendant increase in commercial and private road traffic.

The Collective Response to Wiltshire Councils Core Strategy document.

A there was no mention of the A345 in the 2009 Draft Scooping Document or, again, in the July 2011 full Core Strategy Document, the Enford Parish Council (CSW) carried out a HGV survey on the A345 in July, which was added to the collective response.

The same month, an email was sent to all the Towns and Parish Councils along the A345 from Durrington through to Marlborough requesting views and opinions regarding the increased number of HGVs using the A345 as a North to South through route.

All the towns and villages replied that they had great concerns regarding this issue. The collective response file (by now some 70 pages in length) was delivered to the Core Strategy Teams offices at Melksham on the 1st August 2011, copied to the Hon Claire Perry (MP) (We have since had reply from Claire Perry adding her support to our transport problems along the A345). The issue was also raised at the last Area Boards of Tidworth,. Amesbury and Pewsey and all three showed concerns regarding this situation. We now await the results of this Core Strategy Consultation and hope that Wiltshire Council listens to the unified collective response that has been presented to them.

$30 mph \;$ speed limit from the A345 down Enford Hill to the Junction of Longstreet.

I have received complaints about vehicles going fast along Enford Hill between the A345 and the C32. Please all be advised that this Lane is all part of the 30mph zone that exists on A345 and also the C32 at Long Street. There are several resident entrances along this connection lane including the Church and its car park which the Enford CSW Team will be monitoring in the coming months, including the C32 at the junction of Water Lane. The Police are fully aware of this problem, as it is well known as a "Rat Run" from the A345 through the C32 through Littlecott and East Chisenbury to the A342 Upavon and the MOD Trenchard Lines.

The C32 from the junction of Long Street through to the New Village Hall,

I mentioned in my last report that the above section of road is planned for resurface dressing either this late autumn or in the early spring. As far as I am aware, this programme is still on course and you can be assured that we are on the case, and we will ensure that the promise that was made at the Tidworth Transport Group meeting on the 25/5/11 by Wiltshire Council will be adhered to.

ENFORD COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH

From little acorns, mighty oak tree grow.

During the latter part of 2006, the concept of organising Community Speed Watch within Wiltshire was raised by Parish Councillor Stan Bagwell. Despite being rebuffed by the various authorities, Stan persisted, and in 2008 it was agreed that a pilot scheme would be set up in Enford to monitor the A345. A team of volunteers was gathered, and after undergoing a short course of instruction by Officers of the Wiltshire Constabulary Road Policing Unit, the first Enford CSW operation took place in August 2008.

After only three years, Wiltshire now has in excess of fifty groups operating around the county.

On Saturday 10 September 2011, CSW Wiltshire, in conjunction with members of the RPU, held a 'CSW Safe Day'.

Some twenty three teams participated in this at various locations around the county resulting in an accumulative total of approximately forty six hours of checks. A number of Fixed Penalty Notices were issued by RPU officers, of which two went to drivers passing through Enford. Words of advice were also given to a third driver. The goal of CSW is, by our very presence, to encourage drivers to travel within the legal speed limits, and from figures recently produced by the Wiltshire Police CSW collator, and our own observations, those aspirations are being achieved.

The global economic slowdown is having unfortunate local consequences. As some family budgets are reduced, it becomes more important to set priorities, or face real hardship. In the past month, I have been involved in three incidents involving rent payment. The first was reported as malicious texts, but turned out to be demands for rent arrears. The second was a report of an altercation when a landlord and three buriev colleagues visited his ex-tenant to demand owed rent there and then. The third was a request for police presence at an eviction for excessive rent arrears. It is very sad to see a family having to leave their home. Risk of eviction can be minimised by liaison with landlords and the benefits office. Payment for the roof over one's head must rate as top priority for any family, along with food and heating. I urge any family fallen on hard times to cut out luxuries before allowing the rent arrears or mortgage arrears to build up.

A new non-emergency telephone number has been introduced in Wiltshire. It is 101. easily remembered from the room number in the novel 1984. It is part of a national plan so that eventually 101 will be the non-emergency number everywhere.

Local incidents have included anti social behaviour in Water Lane, and several occurrences of hare coursing, some involving damaged crops and broken fences.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY

Having developed too much grey hair to continue as a credible computer programmer, I recently retrained as a domestic electrical installer. As you might imagine, there was a heavy emphasis on safety. It was very interesting – I thought I'd share with you some of the things I have learned. Electrical safety is all about preventing people getting an electric shock. Three levels of protection are recognised for domestic installations:

- Basic Protection This is provided by the insulation around wires and other live conductors, and the plastic enclosures surrounding sockets and switches. Basic protection is intended to prevent you coming into contact with things which are normally live.
- ♦ Fault Protection This is intended to provide protection in the event of a fault occurring, for example a short circuit (ie. live to neutral), an overloaded appliance, or a loose live wire coming into contact with a metal enclosure. Momentarily, a high current will flow however this will very quickly trip the circuit breaker or blow the fuse (whichever is fitted in your fusebox) and disconnect the supply before any of the wires, cables and accessories have time to overheat and become damaged. Clearly, this requires that all metallic enclosures are properly earthed, otherwise no current would flow in the latter example, the circuit breaker/fuse would not trip, and the enclosure would remain live and you would get a shock when you touched it.
- ♦ Additional Protection In locations such as bathrooms or kitchens, people are at greater risk of electric shock due to the presence of water and/or a lot of white metal enclosures. Current wiring regulations now pretty much require all such locations to be further protected by a residual current detector (RCD). This device is designed to disconnect the supply if it detects even a small current flowing to earth (such as could flow through your body if you touched a metal enclosure which had become accidentally live due to a fault as described above) − this 'trip' current is designed to be well below the lethal level, and the device will trip in less than 40 milliseconds. Additional protection thus protects where either basic protection and/or fault protection has failed. In fact, RCD protection is now also required for any socket which might reasonably be used for connection to outdoor appliances such as lawnmowers, strimmers, hedge -trimmers, pressure washers, etc. So that means pretty much all downstairs socket outlets need to be RCD protected.

Alterations To Your Home You should also be aware that it is a requirement (other than very minor work such as one-for-one replacement of sockets, switches, etc) for an electrician to inspect and test your installation following any addition or alteration. He should then provide you with either:

- ♦ a full 'Electrical Installation Certificate' where there has been a new circuit added to your installation (eg. a new consumer unit (fusebox); an extension to the house, a loft conversion, provision of power to a remote garage or shed)
- or a 'Minor Electrical Installation Works Certificate' where the scope of the work does not
 involve provision of a new circuit. This would include, for example: addition of new socket
 outlets or lighting points to an existing circuit; relocation of existing sockets and lights.

Notifying Local Authority Building Control In addition to giving an inspection and test certificate to the homeowner, the person carrying out the work must also (in certain circumstances) notify the Local Authority Building Control that the work has been completed to a satisfactory standard. This is done either by sending direct to them a copy of the same certificate or notifying them via a competent persons scheme such as BRE, BSI, ELECSA, NAPIT or NICEIC. Note that not all work requiring an installation certificate is also 'notifiable' – as a rule of thumb: if it requires a full installation certificate then it is notifiable; if it is a minor works, but involves outdoors, kitchen, bathroom or anywhere else containing a sink or shower then it is also notifiable.

Periodic Inspection & Testing If you don't have an Electrical Installation Certificate for your home, and have any concerns about the safety of your home installation then you can request a Periodic Inspection Report (also known as a Condition Report). Such reports are also increasingly being requested when selling or renting properties, or by mortgage companies and home insurers. This will involve a qualified electrician carrying out a full inspection and test, and delivery to you of a report listing any defects, damage, deterioration or departures from the safety requirements of the current wiring regulations.



News from Pewsey Children's Centre

If you are a parent/carer of a child aged 0-5 and you have not yet discovered Pewsey Children's Centre now is the time! This purpose built centre is on the same site as Pewsey Primary and Secondary School, and shares the building with Puddleducks Nursery and is open to all families in the Pewsey Community Area with children aged 0-5years. Come along to Curious Creation on Wednesdays, from 10.30-11.30 We have a weekly Stay and Play Session in Woodborough Parish Rooms on Thursday mornings from 10.30-11.30.

The Children's Centre has a fantastic sensory room which can be booked free of charge for half hour sessions on Mondays, and there is a monthly Sensory Play session. On Monday mornings we run a 4-12month Baby and Beyond Group and on Tuesday mornings a 0-6 month TLC, where you can come and meet other families and discuss relevant developmental issues.



WHAT IS NON-STIPENDIARY MINISTRY?





November

A Non-Stipendiary Minister (or NSM and more recently referred to as a Self-Supporting Minister) is someone who does not get paid but performs the same role once fully trained (within their time constraints). They are trained in the same way and are licensed by the Bishop to carry out the same duties as someone who is paid. Generally they work elsewhere in secular employment and live in their own house.

In the new **Avon River Team**, which comprises the parishes of Durrington, Bulford, Milston, Figheldean, Netheravon, Fittleton cum Haxton and Enford, we have three non-stipendiary ministers: Rachel Bussey, who is fully trained, Ann Keating who has two more years of training to do. Tina Draycott will be ordained deacon on the 8 October in Salisbury Cathedral, and she will be fully trained in four years time. They work together with Mark Zammit, the Team Rector, who lives in Durrington, and a new Team Vicar, who will be appointed, God willing, by the New Year, to replace Colin Fox who retired in July. The new Team Vicar (who will be paid a stipend) will live in the Vicarage in Netherayon.

We have two Lay Licensed Ministers (Readers): Chrysogon Bamber and Christine Powne who minister alongside the ordained ministers. Their primary role is to preach and teach, but they have pastoral responsibilities too.

There are also nineteen Lay Pastoral Assistants (LPAs) throughout the seven parishes. They are pastoral visitors and they form an important part of the ministry Team.

FAIRTRADE FAIR

DURRINGTON VILLAGE HALL—SATURDAY 15TH OCTOBER

The Anglican churches in the Avon River Team will be holding a **Fair Trade Fair in Durrington Village Hall on Saturday 15th October**—please come and support this worthwhile event.

WHY FAIRTRADE

In Proverbs, it is written "A poor man's field may produce abundant food, but injustice sweeps it away," (Prov 13:23, NIV). Sadly, that is all too true, even today.

Fairtrade exists because the dominant trade patterns between the West and developing countries are biased; heavily benefitting western companies and keeping small producers in developing countries in poverty. A third of the world's population lives on less than two dollars a day. Markets are structured to ensure profit for those further up the supply chain, whilst the price farmers get for the produce doesn't always even cover the cost of production. Not many families in the West have to make decisions such as whether to buy medicine for a sick relative, or buy seed and animals, or send children to school – we're generally able to do all of the above, and much more besides.

As the Bible says, "This is the kind of fast day I'm after: to break the chains of injustice, get rid of exploitation in the workplace, free the oppressed, cancel debts." (Isaiah 58:6, The Message).

Fairtrade is much more than a mere passing trend. The current state of unjust world trade between rich and poor nations, and the slow progress of change, has been likened to the campaigners arguing for the abolition of the slave trade over two hundred years ago. The status quo seemed acceptable and suited fine those with decision making power – at the time, they felt like there was no need to change. Buying and using Fairtrade certified products means that the producers are paid a fair and stable price for a product. In addition, a 'social premium' is paid to a community cooperative of farmers who must decide democratically how to use it. It's typically spent on access to clean water, schools, health centres, or safe transport, and is a great example of how we can help communities through trade, not aid.

The Fairtrade Foundation's churches scheme is supported by 12 leading organisations, including The Church of England, CAFOD, Christian Aid and the Mothers Union. There are just three goals a church must aim for, to become a Fairtrade Church. These are all attainable with little effort or extra expense.

Firstly, in situations where the church serves drinks, they must use Fairtrade Tea and Coffee.

Secondly, the church should move forward on using additional Fairtrade products. There is a very wide range of Fairtrade products available, perhaps the most suitable for use in church would be sugar, biscuits, dried fruit, fresh fruit, and Communion wine.

Lastly, a Fairtrade church needs to promote Fairtrade, especially during Fairtrade Fortnight in Spring, and at other times when opportunities present.



WAA can be at an incident with - In 11 minutes. You may have heard the phrase 'Golden Hour' this is used to describe the hour directly after an incident has taken place. It is imperative that the injured party receive medical attention within this hour to minimize the risk of life changing injuries or in some cases death.

Some of the main ways the Appeal raises the funds include our wonderful Westbury Shop which continues to grow each year; Dot and her dedicated wolunteers have now raised over 1.5million for the Appeal. Our own Lottery continues to bring in thousands of pounds and pay's out £1,000 a week to the lucky winner! Our new Fundraising events include Parachute Jumps and The Toublail Challenge which will see Paramedic Joanne Munday, Claire from the Appeal and 18 other members of the public climb the highest Atlas Mountain raising funds for WAAA We wish them all good luck.

SALISBURY PLAIN TRAINING AREA NEWS SHEET October 2011

Defence Infrastructure Organisation

STOP PRESS Tread Lightly volunteers working with HQ SPTA and Wiltshire Council have erected 75 new rights of way sign posts on Larkhill Ranges and will continue to install about 30 per month

TRAINING ON SPTA

October sees an increase in training across the Plain with artillery and mortar firing on Larkhill Ranges and 2 x Challenger 2 tank squadrons (2RTR) in the West and East for the whole month.

- **22 Sep 8 Oct** has 101 Logistics Brigade on Exercise GRIFFINS VIPER with 140 heavy wheeled logistic vehicles moving across the Plain
- **8 14 October** sees the main event, the Staff College Demonstration. This will involve large static displays on Old Carter Barracks and Bulford Field, and an armoured mobility demonstration in the area between Carter Barracks and the Everleigh Road. The public are requested to remain on public rights of way and take extra precautions for their safety when in the vicinity.
- **10 21 October** sees the Household Cavalry Regiment deploying 48 x CVR (T) reconnaissance tanks across the whole Plain and the peak of artillery and mortar firing.
- 19 20 October Exercise FIRST VIEW sees 14 more Challenger 2 tanks in the West

The main source of noise complaints is the live firing of 155mm AS90 (Artillery System of the 90s) self propelled guns. The firing is closely managed to ensure that legal noise limits are not exceeded and disturbance is minimised. Although some may find the noise intrusive, it is well below legal limits.
