A WORD FROM REV PHILIP BROMILEY OUR TEAM RECTOR



When I look at a pack of playing cards, the four suits remind me of four truths about the Easter message:

Hearts symbolise Love, Clubs symbolise A Big Wooden Stick, Diamonds symbolise Wealth, and Spades symbolise Digging a Hole.



The Bible tells us clearly that God so *loved* the world that He gave us Jesus. Not only did God humble Himself and become a human being, but Jesus was prepared to love us even when the world chose to reject Him. Jesus demonstrated a heart full of love like no other, by taking the sins of the world on to Himself.



The Lord is a gentleman, Jesus doesn't force us to love Him. He doesn't hit us over the head with a big stick and demand that we do. Jesus simply leaves us with an opportunity. He died for us so that we might be forgiven. Our response is to be thankful and love Him in return, if we wish.

The following guidelines will be followed in allocating funds:

- 1. Awards will be considered every 6 months in March and September.
- 2. Awards will be made for individual projects and are not designed to allow awardees to become reliant on the award on an annual/regular basis.
- 3. Awards will be made to causes that benefit the community and not specific individuals.
- 4. No awards will exceed £1,000.
- 5. For any award to be made, there must be agreement by at least 75% of the Committee.


THE GRADUATE

This film, released in 1967, was the highest grossing film of that year and is even now the 23rd highest, taking inflation into account. It is ranked by the American Film Institute as being the 17th greatest film of all time and has been preserved in the US National Film Registry as being culturally, historically or aesthetically significant.





The film received 7 Academy Award nominations, including Dustin Hoffman for best actor, and won Best Director. It won Dustin Hoffman his star status even though he was paid only £20,000, £4,000 after expenses! Anne Bancroft stars as the seductive Mrs Robinson and Katharine Ross as her daughter. Watch out too for an uncredited appearance by Richard Dreyfus.



The film will be preceded by a talk and Powerpoint presentation by Hugo Vickers, who will tell the fascinating story of which stars were either rejected by the producer, or turned down roles they were offered.

Ten Easter Facts

1. Easter Sunday celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

After Jesus was crucified, his body was taken down from the cross, and placed in a cave. The cave was guarded by Roman soldiers and a massive stone was put over the entrance. On Sunday, three days after the crucifixion, Mary Magdalene visited the tomb to find that the stone had been moved



and Jesus' body had gone. According to the Gospels in the Bible, Mary Magdalene saw Jesus that day and Christians believe God raised Jesus from the dead. Christians call this the Resurrection and believe it shows that Jesus died for our suns and that mankind will have eternal life in Heaven.



- 2. It is traditional to eat Easter Eggs on Easter Sunday. Even before Easter was celebrated, our ancestors celebrated Spring at a similar time to Easter and eggs were a symbol of new life with Spring being a time to celebrate new life and rebirth.
- 3. Easter Sunday is on a different date every year. Easter falls on the first Sunday after the Full Moon that is after the 21st March.
- 4. It is traditional to eat lamb on Easter Sunday. The eating of lamb on Easter Sunday goes back further than Easter and is connected to Passover, a Jewish festival. Passover celebrates the Israelites being freed from slavery and at the end of Passover a 'Passover lamb' is eaten. It is likely that Jews who converted to Christianity kept the tradition of eating a lamb but rather than eat it on Passover they ate it on Easter Sunday.



5. Easter Island was discovered on Easter Sunday. In 1772 on 5th April, Jacob Roggeveen first stepped foot on the Island. It was Easter Sunday so he named the island Easter Island. It was already called Rapa Nui by the people who lived on the island but that didn't stop Roggeveen. So in the English speaking world we call it Easter Island but it's real name is Rapa Nui.



6. Easter Witches on Easter Sunday.
Children in Sweden and Finland dress up as
Easter Witches on Easter Sunday and go door-todoor with bunches of willow twigs. They will say a
blessing which is said to drive away evil spirits and
in return the children are given a chocolate egg.



7. On Easter Sunday thousands of people go to

the Vatican City to hear the Pope's blessing from the church's balcony. This is known as 'Urbi et Orbi' which means 'To the city and to the world'.

8. The word Easter came before Christianity. It originates from an Anglo-

Saxon springtime goddess named Eostre.

- 9. In Hungary, women dress up in traditional clothes on Easter Sunday and get splashed with water. This tradition has happened since the second century AD, which means it is even older than Christianity.
- 10. Between 80 and 90 million chocolate eggs are eaten each year in Britain

Water Lane By Jane Young



Looking at the recent spring at the bottom of water lane, I wondered if any recent villagers would like to know a little of the history of Water Lane.

The spring in the village at the bottom of Water Lane happens nearly every year depending on the water table.

There is also a main one which doesn't happen very often, it starts at Baden Down Farm almost 2 miles from the village.

Once it starts running, it then follows the contour of the terrain carrying on down the valley known as the Rainbow Bottom, then dropping down into the road aptly named Water Lane. Lovely crystal clear water about 6inches deep then flows on down the lane to where the ground levels out where it drops once again into a field on the left hand side. It then follows the valley through the middle of 2 fields and on through what was once the coal yard (now 2 private houses) carrying on through Lower Farm, where there used to be a tunnel into the wall to allow the water onto the road.

This has only happened twice in almost 80 years and I have been lucky enough to see both of them.

CHARRED BROCCOLI WITH WILD GARLIC HOUMOUS AND A SPRING ONION PESTO.

It's that time of year that chefs quite stereotypically say that Yorkshire Rhubarb and Wild garlic are some of their favourite ingredients to use. The following dish shows the ease at which Wild garlic can be used.

Ingredients

500g Purple sprouting broccoli or tender stem broccoli



WILD GARLIC AND BUTTERBEAN HOUMOUS

240g cooked butterbeans beans
12 wild garlic leaves
30ml of rapeseed oil
2 tbsp of tahini
1 small lemon, juiced
Salt and pepper
Wild garlic flowers



SPRING ONION PESTO

8 spring onions, roasted 30g pine nuts 15g Old Winchester finely grated 1/4 bunch parsley chopped 1 tsp white wine vinegar 1/2 lemon, juiced 60ml rapeseed oil



Method

Houmous

Drain a tin of cooked butter beans and rinse with cold water.

Weigh 240g of the beans place into a blender.

Wash and drain the wild garlic, add to the blender along with the tahini, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Start blending, slowly add the rapeseed oil to emulsify. Adjust seasoning as needed and set aside once you have a smooth houmous consistency.

Pesto

Take 8 spring onions, remove outer layer and wash so they're clean. Place onto a baking tray and roast at 180°c for about 5-10 minutes with a little rapeseed oil, until tender.

Toast the pine nuts in a frying pan on the stove until golden brown. Allow the nuts and spring onions to cool. Place all ingredients into a food processor other than the Old Winchester and pulse. There should still be a slight texture to your pesto. Fold through the cheese and adjust seasoning.

Take your broccoli, trim it and blanch in boiling salted water. Size depending this'll take 2-4 minutes. It needs to be just cook with a slight bite still. Drain and drizzle with a little rapeseed oil. Char on a preheated griddle pan to get some nice colour and smoky flavour to your broccoli.

To serve ensure the pesto and houmous is room temperature. Place a large spoonful of houmous onto your place, spread it out a bit. Top with your broccoli and then your p esto. Finish with wild garlic flowers to garnish. Enjoy!



Abridged Draft Minutes of the meeting of 7th March 2023

Residents in attendance were Mr John Manser, Mr Barry Chamberlaine, Mr Greg Parker and Mr George Prior-Palmer of the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust

23/020 Public Question Time

George Prior-Palmer of Wiltshire Wildlife Trust was in attendance to explain and discuss the Trust's Planning Application to realign the Avon river at West Chisenbury to its natural course and flood plain areas. He explained that the river had previously been straightened (to improve the flow) and dredged (to deepen it). The main issue is the health of the river and at present it is badly polluted mainly due to the amount of phosphates and nitrates draining into it and destroying the natural habitat, be it plant or animal species. The application plans, reports, modelling etc had been supplied directly to the Clerk who had circulated them to the Cllrs and those residents who had requested information. Most had read some or all of the plans.

Overall, the work would be similar to that done in 2017 at A crossing and should this plan be successful, it was hoped to join the two areas together. The work is not expected to start until August or early Autumn and the meanders, riffles and pools would be created first before being connected to the river. Finally, the natural flora would be given a small start to allow it to take over naturally in future - willows, sedges and reeds irises etc. Questions were raised on water extraction and its effect, how this might affect the current flooding problems in Enford, the local fishing syndicates, whether there might be pools of stagnant water giving a breeding ground to mosquitoes, what would happen to any archaeological finds and the change in appearance of the winterbournes. George responded that there should not be any adverse effect or increase of water extraction as the area would retain more water and the flow should be generally reduced. The flooding problems experienced in Enford are either surface water coming off the Plain or winterbournes rather than the river itself. George has a meeting this week with the Chisenbury syndicate and will contact the local fishing syndicates downstream as this is an aspect on which he had not previously consulted, though he didn't envisage there being a large impact. The 'pools' would not be completely stagnant, there would be a gradual flow of water through them which mosquitoes would not find suitable for breeding and an Archaeologist would be on a watching brief throughout the whole project. Cllr Waight commented that the winterbournes on his land had started earlier than usual and wondered whether this was due to the new borehole recently created further downstream. Cllr Hiskett asked if there was any link between this project and a similar, but larger project at Figheldean Mill. George explained that they were separate projects run by separate organisations with different funding but aimed to achieve the same thing. Cllr Richard Roberts thanked George for attending and answering all the points that were raised. George and the attending residents then left the meeting. All Cllrs agreed that they were happy to support the plan.

23/021 Police Matters and Neighbourhood Watch

There was no Police presence or recent Report covering Enford. Cllr Clark highlighted the following issues from the Neighbour Watch website:

- i. They are predicting a rise in cyber crime and want people to be alert for scammers etc ii. If you need a plumber, make sure you check first that they are on the approved list. iii. Looking ahead to warmer weather where one might leave a window open, they are recommending the use of window restrictors.
- iv. Vodafone has launched a new app called '**Zoteria**'. It enables people to report hate crime incidents, either against themselves or on behalf of someone else, and access support from LGBTQ+ charities. It also aims to improve the reporting of trends relating to LGBTQ+ hate crime,

and so build a more accurate picture of the issue across the UK. Zoteria is free to download via app stores now.

A point was raised about scammers now being able to use the local STD code (01980) when phoning potential victims. You are drawn in to thinking it is a local call and you drop your guard. Be alert at all times.

Cllr Richard Roberts mentioned the fact that the Deputy Chief Constable had joined the Speedwatch team recently. Not only were there fewer hand signals exchanged by the drivers but his speed camera automatically generates immediate fines for people breaking the speed limit.

23/026 Matters Arising

- i. <u>New bins in East Chisenbury.</u> The two new bins previously agreed by the Council have been installed and are in use in East Chisenbury
- **ii.** New Defibrillator in East Chisenbury. The Defibrillator has arrived and is now awaiting the consultation with an electrician before being installed on the side of The Red Lion. Once installed it will be notified on the Webnos system (for Police and Ambulances) and Cllr Farrow will do the weekly checks and reports.
- iii. <u>Planning for the Annual Litter Pick</u> Saturday 18th March. Cllr Roberts has the gloves, sticks, bags, tabards etc and will replenish any extras required before the day. It will start as usual at the central bus stop in Enford at 10.30am for a brief safety talk and allocation of people to routes in the Parish. Finishing at circa midday there will be free teas, coffees and bacon rolls supplied by The Swan. This year the Parish Council will be funding the cost. The Clerk will make sure that WC will collect the rubbish on Monday so it is not lying around.
- iv. <u>Annual Parish Meeting.</u> Due to a change of dates in the PC diary, the **Annual Parish Meeting** will be held on Tuesday, 11th April at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. This meeting is open to all residents and is for the various groups and clubs in the parish to give their annual reports events during the year, events planned for next year and a financial report which also assists the PC in awarding donations each year. The Clerk will contact all those concerned in due course. To be more sociable at the same time, the Parish Council will be supplying wine and soft drinks for those who wish to attend.
- v. <u>Aster Licence fee.</u> The Clerk reported that she has been informed of another annual increase by Aster. This is for the ability to walk across approximately 5 metres of grass in order to enter the Playpark. In 2019 it was £5.00 per annum, in 2020 it was £100.00, in 2021 it was £101.40, 2022 it was £106.36 and Aster now say that for 2023 it will be £119.76 an increase of 12.6% on the previous year. The Clerk has spoken to Aster regarding this but 3x one day licences would cost even more. A discussion was had on the best approach to this rise. The Clerk will await the arrival of the bill.

CAN YOU HELP PLEASE?

Wiltshire Link Schemes are voluntary groups which offer a transport and good neighbour service to members of our local communities, who need to access essential services, including medical appointments, shopping for food, or to attend social activities. These essential services provide a safety net for those unable to access services in other ways. Link Schemes aim to complement other services, statutory and voluntary, and clients would be directed to another service if appropriate

TWO WAYS YOU CAN HELP?

<u>Coordinators</u> – we have a small group of volunteer coordinators who work on a rota system. Our clients telephone the Link number to book transport for their appointments/visits. The duty coordinator will find a volunteer driver who is free for that date. The Link number is a mobile phone which is passed between coordinators. It, of course, has voicemail and text facilities.

This is something you can do from home and pretty much in your own time to suit your personal circumstances. If you are unable to answer a call the client will leave a voicemail which you can respond to when you take the messages.

<u>Driving</u> – We are always looking for more drivers. A shortage of drivers on a particular day would mean that we are unable to fulfil requests. Drivers may claim 45p per mile to cover expenses. It may be that you can only manage one or two drives a month. That is still very helpful. Drivers are volunteers and so always have the option to say they are not available on a particular day. Clients are asked to make a voluntary donation, which is how the scheme is funded.




